SUMMARY BACKGROUND:

The City's contract with Murrey's Disposal stipulates that rates will be adjusted annually based on two factors. The first factor is the change in landfill/disposal costs. In March 2024, Pierce County will be increasing the landfill rate from \$171.23 per ton to \$174.84 per ton. The second factor allows Murrey's an annual inflation increase equal to 80% of the Consumer Price Index for the Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue area for the period of October to October of the previous year. Eighty percent of the CPI change for this period is 3.83%.

Our agreement also allows for the contractor to apply for rate adjustments to reflect unforeseen costs arising during the term of the agreement. As a result of Washington's Climate Commitment Act, Murrey's has begun incurring a carbon fee on all fuel purchases. They have requested to pass through this increase at a rate of \$0.19/month to residential customers and between \$0.28/month to \$2.84/month to commercial customers depending on level of service. A detailed list of the proposed 2023 rates is attached to the Resolution as exhibit A. The public was provided a forty-five (45) day notice of the proposed rate increase, which is scheduled to go into effect March 1, 2024.

District Manager Steven Hopkins from Murrey's Disposal will be available to answer additional questions.

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUMNER, WASHINGTON,
ADOPTING THE 2021 MURREY’S DISPOSAL COMPANY RATE INCREASE.**

WHEREAS, the City of Sumner’s contract with Murrey’s Disposal Company stipulates that the rates will be adjusted each year for both the increase in landfill tipping fees as well as 80% of CPI for refuse and recycling activities; and

WHEREAS, the contract allows for Murrey’s to seek an adjustment due to unforeseen costs and Murrey’s is requesting an additional increase to offset the Washington Climate Commitment Act; and

WHEREAS, the City of Sumner provided the public with a 45-day notice of the proposed rate increase.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUMNER, WASHINGTON, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Sumner City Council adopts the 2024 Murrey’s Disposal Company rate increase, attached hereto as Exhibit A and adopted by reference.

Section 2. Corrections by City Clerk or Code Reviser. Upon approval of the city attorney, the city clerk and the code reviser are authorized to make necessary corrections to this resolution, including but not limited to the correction of clerical errors; or references to other local, state, or federal laws, codes, rules, or regulations.

Section 3. Upon passage and approval of this Resolution, it shall take effect March 1, 2024.

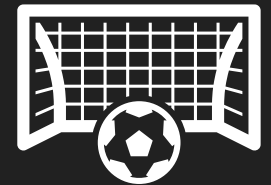

Summary Report: MiCasa Housing

Mi Casa owns and operates 18 housing units in Sumner, WA as permanent, affordable housing for very low-income families. We have three 2-bedroom four-plexes and two 3-bedroom triplexes located a few blocks north of, and within easy walking to, the Fred Meyer shopping center.

We provide housing for 18 households with 64 residents. Household size ranges from 2 to 7 people. The majority (11/18) of these households consist of single mothers with children. Last year their average household income was \$48,600. Four of these households are below 30% of HUD Area Median Income (AMI) and below ,7 households are 30-50% AMI. We try to keep rents affordable at less than 30% of household income. 2024 rents range from \$590 to \$1877.

All our Sumner properties are under the Pierce County HOME program. Two of our fourplexes and one of our triplexes are also under the Washington State Housing Trust Fund.

Mi Casa strives to keep our properties attractive and free from the stigma of poverty. In August 2022, we replaced the roof and repaired the gutters and downspouts on one of our triplexes. In April 2022, we installed a stormwater management system at our other triplex. In 2020, we completed major exterior and interior renovations to our three fourplexes.

Your \$5000 in grant monies for 2023 was used to off-set the expenses of water and sewer, fire insurance, lawn care and routine maintenance and repairs and property management. These funds helped ensure these properties were safe and well-kept homes for our tenants.

City of Sumner's \$5,000 grant covers 5.87% of our total costs of \$85,228.51 for those 5 rental buildings in 2023.

5.87% of \$18,810.00 is \$1,104.15 for property management.

5.87% of \$ 7,844.13 is \$ 460.45 for fire insurance.

5.87% of \$23,812.67 is \$1,397.80 for water and sewer.

5.87% of \$19,449.76 is \$1,141.70 for repairs and maintenance.

5.87% of \$15,311.95 is \$898.81 for lawn care

Total \$5,002.91

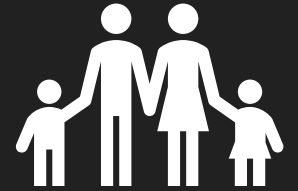

- **Bonney Lake High School:** 38 students benefited from Tardis services.
- **Sumner High School:** 13 students were supported by the program.
- **Elhi Hill High School:** This academic year marked the initiation of services at EHHS, where, as of January 2024, Vadis is currently assisting 12 students.

During the summer of 2023, Vadis achieved a milestone by placing one paid intern in the Sumner-Bonney Lake School District. This accomplishment was made possible through the establishment of a fantastic relationship with a local business, Scott's Classic Quality Brake & Muffler. This partnership not only provided a valuable opportunity for a student but also allowed our team to advocate for individual employment and community-based assessment opportunities within the local business community.

Looking ahead to Summer 2024, we aspire to build upon our success and increase the number of intern placements. The experience gained and lessons learned from our previous endeavors will undoubtedly contribute to the enrichment of these upcoming opportunities.

Despite our accomplishments, we recognize a persistent challenge that remains a barrier to our students' success—namely, the lack of public transportation in our locality. This issue disproportionately affects students at Bonney Lake High School, creating a hurdle in their access to education and employment opportunities. As we continue to address this concern, we seek the Sumner City Council's support and collaboration in exploring solutions to enhance transportation accessibility for all students within our district.

We greatly appreciate the ongoing support and collaboration of the Sumner City Council.

The impact of your funding is evident in the increased confidence and readiness exhibited by our students as they approach the workforce. We have witnessed tangible improvements in their ability to present themselves professionally, collaborate effectively, and navigate real-world challenges.
